Flooding is a Serious Risk for many Howard Residents

With water levels in Duck Creek, Green Bay, and Lake Michigan well above normal averages and approaching record highs, the potential for flooding is just one big snow melt or steady rainfall away. The Village of Howard is encouraging residents to take the responsibility to be prepared for flooding!

Brown County officials, municipal leaders, local and regional agencies, and other organizations have joined together to educate residents and plan ahead for flooding events. The campaign's slogan is "Be Prepared. Make a Plan. Stay Informed."

#1 BE PREPARED!

Are you in a floodplain? You can enter your address into the Brown County GIS floodplain map at www.FloodinginBC.com to find out. However, even if you're not in a floodplain, you could still be at risk. If your property has flooded before, it likely will flood again. If you live near a floodplain, you also could be impacted by street closures.

If you are in a floodplain, do the following TODAY:

Move personal property

out of vulnerable areas, such as basements and off of floors.

Purchase flood insurance.

Homeowner's insurance does NOT cover flooding. A separate flood insurance policy is needed, which can take 30-60 days to go into effect; the time to get it is now! The FEMA National Flood Insurance Program is one resource.

Sump Pump

Buy an extra sump pump and/or a battery-operated pump in case you lose power.

Backflow Prevention

If your home doesn't already have one, install a backflow preventer to protect our drinking water supply!

Emergency Kit

Prepare an emergency kit in case of power outages or evacuation.

Be flood safe!

Never enter flooded basements, and never play in or drive through flooded streets.

#2 MAKE A PLAN!

Know where you and your pets can go in the case of evacuation. Due to limited public shelter spaces and their inability to accept pets, try to make arrangements with friends and family out of the area now. If you have elderly or disabled family members or neighbors, be sure they have a plan too.

Prepare an emergency kit and a "go" bag. Include a flashlight and extra batteries, snacks and water, extra clothing, cash, prescription medications, a phone contact list, cell phones and chargers, and important documents.

Be sure to know alternate routes to get out of your home and neighborhood and to your safe place. Never drive through flooded streets!

#3 STAY INFORMED!

Sign up for the Code Red Alert System. Brown County has the ability to notify impacted subscribers via phone, text, and/or email when an emergency -- such as major flooding that's causing street closures and evacuations -- is occurring in their area.

Keep Pets and Wildlife Safe this Spring and Summer

The Village of Howard Animal Control Department handles stray (found) pets, works to reunite lost pets, handles complaints, assists with injured and nuisance wildlife, and advocates for the humane treatment of all animals in our community. The department is staffed by Animal Control Officer Monica Hoff and a team of paid on-call citizen volunteers.

SEASONAL PET CARE

We all love spending the long, sunny days of summer outdoors with our furry companions, but being overeager in hot weather can spell danger. To keep your pet safe this summer, take these precautions by ASPCA experts:

VISIT THE VET for a spring or early-summer checkup. Make sure your pets get tested for heartworm if they aren't on year-round preventative medication.

PETS CAN GET DEHYDRATED quickly, so give them plenty of fresh, clean water when it's hot or humid outdoors. Make sure your pets have a shady place to get out of the sun, be careful not to over-exercise them, and keep them indoors if it's extremely hot.

NEVER LEAVE YOUR ANIMALS ALONE IN A PARKED VEHICLE. Not only can it lead to fatal heat stroke, it is illegal in several states!

WHEN THE TEMPERATURE IS VERY HIGH, don't let your dog linger on hot asphalt. Being so close to the ground, your pooch's body can heat up quickly, and sensitive paw pads can burn. Keep walks during these times to a minimum.

COMMONLY USED RODENTICIDES and lawn and garden insecticides can be harmful to cats and dogs if ingested. Keep them out of reach, as well as citronella candles, tiki torch products and insect coils.

FOOD AND DRINK COMMONLY FOUND AT BARBEQUES can be poisonous to pets. Keep alcoholic beverages and snacks away from pets.

LEAVE PETS AT HOME when you head out to Fourth of July celebrations, and never use fireworks around pets. Many pets are fearful of loud noises and can become lost, scared or disoriented. It's best to keep your pets safe from the noise in a quiet, sheltered and escape-proof area of your home.

MAKE SURE YOUR DOG ALWAYS WEARS A COLLAR with identification tags and that all dogs and cats are microchipped.


LOST AND FOUND PETS

It is important to try to reunite lost and found pets with their owners. State law requires that found pets be reported to the animal control officer and/or stray holding facility for the municipality. If you lose or find a pet, please call Animal Control Officer Monica Hoff immediately at (920) 819-6709. Please also notify the Wisconsin Humane Society - Green Bay at (920) 469-3110.

NUISANCE RODENTS AND WILDLIFE

Poison is an inhumane and hazardous option for deterring rodents. If you put out poison for mice and rats, you will kill the eagle, hawk, owl, fox or any other animal that may eat that mouse. Pets also are unfortunate victims who frequently find and consume poisons meant for other animals.

Trapping and moving animals may seem like a good idea; however, that might not be the best way to evict nuisance wildlife. Call Animal Control for the most humane and effective tips to handle rodents and wildlife.



Be prepared for November Elections

Are you registered to vote? To vote in Wisconsin, you must first register. Online voter registration is available at myvote.wi.gov.

How You Can Register To Vote:

ONLINE With Drivers License

www.myvote.wi.gov

People with a Wisconsin driver license or state ID card whose address is current with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation can complete their online registration immediately. People who need to update their address with DOT can accomplish that online and complete their online registration.

ONLINE Without Drivers License

People without a Wisconsin driver license or state ID card can fill out the voter registration form online, then print it, sign it and mail it to their municipal clerk's office along with a proof-of residence document. The website has detailed instructions. If you do not have a printer where you are, you can save the completed form as a PDF and plan to have a family member or a friend with a printer, or a copy center, to print it for you.

IN PERSON Registration

You also can register in-person during regular office hours at Howard Village Hall or at your polling place on Election Day. Since the November presidential election is predicted to bring a large voter turnout, it is highly recommended that you register in advance. Voter registration forms are also available in the Election section of the Village of Howard website at www.villageofhoward.com. All voters must submit proof of residence with their voter registration.

Do You Have Proper Identification?

Wisconsin's Voter ID Law requires voters to present a valid form of identification before they can vote. The following are acceptable forms of identification for voting purposes:

- A Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license, even if driving privileges are revoked or suspended
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card or driver license without a photo issued under the religious exemption
- Military ID card issued by a U.S. uniformed service
- A U.S. passport
- An identification card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin (May be used even if expired before the most recent general election.)

These are additional acceptable forms of ID for voting purposes, but they must be unexpired:

- A veteran's photo identification card issued by the Veterans Health Administration of the federal Department of Veterans Affairs
- A certificate of naturalization that was issued not earlier than two years before the date of an election at which it is presented
- A driving receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days)
- An identification card receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days)
- A photo identification card issued

by a Wisconsin accredited university, college or technical college that contains date of issuance, signature of student, and an expiration date no later than two years after date of issuance. Also, the university, college or technical college ID must be accompanied by a separate document that proves enrollment.

- A citation or notice of intent to revoke or suspend a Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license that is dated within 60 days of the date of the election.

If you do NOT have one of these photo IDs, you can learn how to get a free state ID card at www.bringit.wi.gov.



Skip the Election Day lines

Under Wisconsin law, voters do not need a reason or excuse – such as being out of town on Election Day – to vote absentee. Any voter who prefers to vote by absentee ballot may request one. You have several options for requesting an absentee ballot and casting your vote.

Request an Absentee Ballot by mail:

Online at myvote.wi.gov

If you are a registered Wisconsin voter and you have Internet access, the easiest way to request an absentee ballot is at MyVote Wisconsin here: <https://myvote.wi.gov>. Just look for the “Vote Absentee” button near the top of the page. On a mobile phone, use the menu button in the upper right corner of the website. There is a three-step process that starts with putting in your name and date of birth, followed by requesting your ballot. If you don’t already have a photo ID on file with your clerk’s office, you can upload a copy. Mobile phone users can take a picture and upload it to MyVote. Absentee ballot requests submitted this way go directly to the clerk’s office, and you can track your ballot by returning to the website.

Download an Application

You also can download the Application for Absentee Ballot (GAB-121) in the Elections section of the Village of Howard website at www.villageofhoward.com. Just complete the form and mail it to Howard Village Hall, 2456 Glendale Ave., Howard, WI 54313. Your application must be received by the clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday before the election in order for an absentee ballot to be SENT to you. You will also need to provide a copy of your acceptable photo ID with your request. If you have not previously provided a copy of photo ID, photo ID must accompany your first application by mail. More information about photo ID can be found at www.bringit.wi.gov.

If you are not already registered, you need to register to vote before an absentee ballot can be sent to you.

Voters who are indefinitely confined, meaning they have a difficult time getting to the polls due to age, illness, infir-

mity, or disability, may request that a ballot be automatically sent to them for each election. Indefinitely confined voters do not need to provide a photo ID with their absentee ballot request.

If you or someone you know are indefinitely confined you will make this designation in box 6 of the Application for Absentee Ballot (GAB-121). More information on the exceptions to the photo ID law can be found at: <http://bringit.wi.gov/are-there-exceptions-new-law>

Military and Overseas voters have additional options for absentee ballot delivery. Military and permanent overseas voters do not need to provide a photo ID with their request.

Options and Deadlines for Returning Your Absentee Ballot

Completed absentee ballots may be mailed back by U.S. Postal Service or other delivery service or may be hand delivered to Howard Village Hall. Completed absentee ballots must be delivered to the municipal clerk no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day.

In-Person Absentee Voting at your Municipal Clerk’s Office (Early Voting)

You can also vote absentee at Howard Village Hall. In-person absentee voting (also known as early voting) runs on weekdays for two weeks before an election, ending at 5 p.m. or the close of business (whichever is later) on the Friday before the election. Early voting is no longer permitted on weekends. You will need to show your acceptable photo ID for voting when voting by in-person absentee ballot. Do You Know Where To Vote?

The Village of Howard has four polling locations. Each polling location is divided by wards. For the November 3rd election, residents in the following wards will vote at the specified polling locations:

WARDS 1-2, 9-10, 11-12, 13-14 AND 18:

- ▶ Green Bay Community Church, 600 Cardinal Lane

WARDS 3-4 AND 5-6:

- ▶ Howard Village Hall, 2456 Glendale Ave.

WARDS 7-8:

- ▶ Meadowbrook Church, 701 Hillcrest Heights

WARDS 15-17:

- ▶ Fire Station #2, 4165 Shawano Ave.

If you are not sure in which ward you reside, you can view a ward map on the Village of Howard website at www.villageofhoward.com or visit myvote.wi.gov and click on “Where do I vote?”.

WHAT TO EXPECT ON ELECTION DAY



STATE IT

As always, you’ll need to state your full name and address for the election official who will check your information in the poll book. Understandably, some people are uneasy about announcing their name in public, but it is the law, and it helps ensure openness in elections.



SHOW IT

Show your photo ID so poll workers can confirm that you are you. The address on your ID doesn’t have to be current. And the name on your ID doesn’t need to be an exact match for your name in the poll book. *(So, Richards who go by Rich can relax.)* Of course, there are certain requirements. Your ID should look like you, even if you’ve colored your hair, shaved your beard or lost some weight.



SIGN IT

Finally, you’ll sign the poll book (unless a physical disability prevents it). Your signature or mark should go right next to your name and address. Now you’re ready to vote!

Let's Work Together To Protect Our Waterways

From washing cars to mowing, fertilizing, and watering lawns, most outdoor household activities impact our environment and sensitive waterways. The Howard Public Works Department encourages residents to make simple changes to limit the pollutants we send down the storm drains that carry toxins directly to our streams, rivers and lakes.

UNDERSTANDING STORM WATER RUNOFF

Storm water runoff is the draining away of water from rain or snow melt over the ground, pavements, or rooftops. As it flows, storm water runoff can pick up debris, grass clippings, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and deposit them into a storm sewer system or water body.

Anything that enters a storm sewer system can be discharged untreated into the water bodies we use for swimming, fishing, and drinking water. Some of the Village of Howard's more recent subdivisions and developments do include storm water management and treatment facilities; however, even these facilities don't capture all the pollutants in runoff.

Here are some of the biggest hazards found in storm water:

YARD AND LANDSCAPE WASTE: Try to keep grass clippings, brush, and leaf piles out of the roadway ditches or curb and gutter. Loose particles of this type, even though they seem natural and harmless, can and will be carried away with runoff and provide unwanted nutrients and minerals to receiving waters. These nutrients and minerals help fuel the algae blooms we see on our local lakes and rivers.

LAWN FERTILIZERS AND PESTICIDES: Apply fertilizers and pesticides at recommended rates. Avoid allowing fertilizer to fall on paved surfaces. Sweep excess fertilizer back onto the lawn.

PET WASTE: Did you know that nearly 20% of the bacteria found in water samples in Seattle, Washington, and 25% in the Kansas City region were matched with pet waste? Clean up the waste in your yard and be prepared on your walks. Bring a bag.

CAR MAINTENANCE/WASHING: When working on your car make sure you dispose of waste oil and fluids appropriately. Many service centers will take used oils at no charge! Wash your car on a lawn, or area where wash water will not run into a street or storm drain. Also, use soap sparingly. Even biodegradable soap is toxic to wildlife.

UNDERSTANDING ILLICIT DISCHARGES

With few exceptions, anything other than pure storm water sent to the village's drainage system or to streams, rivers, wetlands and lakes is considered an illicit discharge. Basically, everything is a pollutant that may be discharged accidentally or on purpose, directly to pipes or indirectly by flowing off of the land surface with rain, snow or ice melt.

Examples include hydraulic oil spills, gasoline spills, pesticides, rat poison, plant waste, garbage, sewage, oil, gasoline, antifreeze, household chemicals, biological materials, radioactive substances, etc. Less obvious items include construction refuse, rock, sand, dirt, soil, grass clippings, swimming pool chemicals, fertilizer, and pet waste.

Keep an eye out for suspicious activity! If you witness any illicit discharges, please call (920) 434-4060.

VOLUNTEER WITH US

The Village of Howard wants to spread the message of the importance of keeping waste oil, dirt, grass, leaves, fertilizer, and other household products out of storm sewer inlets that ultimately drain to our lakes and streams.

Earth Day or any day is a great day to volunteer your time to stencil storm drains within the Village of Howard. The stenciling consists of painting the likeness of a fish with the message "Dump No Waste – Drains to Stream." The Village of Howard will donate all of the materials to help you or your group implement this program.

REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

Howard Leisure Services (HLS) has implemented a new registration system, which handles both program registrations and facility reservations. Registration can be done in the following ways:

- 1. Online registration** is available by following the links at www.villageofhoward.com. You will be able to log in to your own family account to register.
- 2. Fill out a paper registration form.** Fill out the form as completely as possible the first time it is used. For subsequent registrations, only the "head of household" information (top line), participant information (chart) and signature at the bottom is needed (and any changes to the other information). NON-RESIDENT POLICY

HLS programs and activities are supported by the Village tax-base. Non-residents may not be allowed to register for all programs. In the programs that do allow non-resident participation, the participant will be required to pay their "fair share" of the program. The program fee for non-residents is an additional \$15, which is indicated in the fee section of each program.

PAYMENT POLICY

The Village of Howard accepts the following forms of payment: cash, check, debit or credit card. Credit/Debit cards are only accepted in person at the Village Hall and online. Full refunds will be given when HLS cancels a class or makes a change in the class schedule that no longer fits the participant's needs OR the participant submits a request in writing at least 2 weeks prior to the start of the class.
